


Sara KoumouSUNY Nassau Graduate



Nassau-Adelphi Gateway: Nassau Community College, Adelphi Launch Co-Curricular Partnership for Student Success

This Fall, 30 SUNY Nassau students are earning their associate degrees while being a part of campus life at Adelphi University. In addition to being able to live at Adelphi and participate in University activities, they also have access to streamlined transfer pathways for completing their bachelor's degrees.

Called Nassau-Adelphi Gateway, the distinctive partnership is a first of its kind on Long Island and one of only a few in the country. The option provides a best-of-both-worlds choice with the affordable tuition of beginning one's studies at Nassau Community College while taking advantage of the four-year co-curricular experience -- living and dining on campus, participating in clubs and recreation, and generally being part of the Adelphi community outside the classroom. Students will then be able to easily transfer into an Adelphi degree program and hit the ground running.

"Adelphi is committed to helping students achieve success in individualized ways, and I am pleased that this program offers an equitable and appealing option to students planning to earn a bachelor's degree," said Christine M. Riordan, PhD, president of Adelphi. "As part of our vibrant Adelphi community from the start of their academic journey at Nassau Community College, students will seamlessly have access to a four-year experience in a way that works best for them. We look forward to building on our strong partnership with

Nassau Community College, and supporting students' success in accessible and meaningful ways."

NCC students who are enrolled under the new program are able to use Adelphi facilities, participate in Adelphi student clubs, organizations and leadership development programs, have a parking decal for Adelphi's campus at no charge, have their application and deposit fees waived and have access to early academic advising from Adelphi's transfer student success team.

"At Nassau Community College, we are focused on providing our students with equitable opportunities that provide a solid foundation for their future successes, and with Nassau-Adelphi Gateway we are doing just that," said Jermaine F. Williams, EdD, Nassau Community College president. "This partnership builds on an already existing positive relationship NCC has with Adelphi and we look forward to advancing the College's efforts around student access, completion and post-completion success."



Baldwin High School Partners with SUNY Nassau Community College on Innovative Early College Program

Eligible BHS Seniors Attending SUNY Nassau's Campus, Earning Credits Towards Degree

Baldwin Union Free School District is unveiling an exciting initiative with Nassau Community College (SUNY Nassau). Through SUNY Nassau's Dual Enrollment Program, starting this month, pre-qualified Baldwin High School Seniors are starting their back-to-school journey by walking onto a college campus instead of through the front doors of the high school.

Thirteen students from the Class of 2021 started taking college courses on September 1, 2021 at the SUNY Nassau Campus to earn college credits towards a degree as part of an innovative education partnership between the Baldwin Union Free School District and the College. Baldwin is the first district to enter a dual-enrollment partnership with the College where students are on the community college's campus and considered full time.

"Our students will take courses that will help determine their future area of study and be

able to graduate high school and attend higher education, not only prepared and confident, but as sophomores," Baldwin Schools Superintendent Dr. Shari Camhi said.

The students are taking up to 6 classes this semester, including a math course, a political science course, an economics course, a science course, an English course, and a Physical Education course. These classes are dual enrollment courses that were selected to align with high school graduation requirements. The students will simultaneously earn high school and college credits.

"Community Colleges are a critical access point to higher education and a bridge to fulfilling the dreams of so many students. SUNY Nassau's Dual Enrollment Program seeks to provide high school students with the opportunity to advance in their collegiate academic journey while still enrolled in high school," said Dr. Jermaine F. Williams, President, SUNY Nassau. "I appreciate Dr. Camhi's innovative and strong leadership that has been a driving force for bringing this partnership to fruition. As New York State's, largest single campus community college, it is imperative that we are meeting the needs of the communities we serve and providing equitable opportunities for students so they can achieve their goals both inside and outside the classroom."

The credits the students earn at SUNY Nassau will be transferable to any State University of New York (SUNY) College. This distinctive partnership will allow the high school students to be full-time non-matriculated college students and take their courses on the SUNY Nassau campus next year, which will save students time and money, as they will already have one year of college study completed whether they attend a two-year or four-year college or university.



Guided Pathways

Guided Pathways is an integrated, SUNY system-wide approach to student success utilizing intentionally designed, structured educational experiences to guide each student from high school to postsecondary entry through to attainment of high-quality credentials and rewarding careers. At SUNY Nassau we continue to advance the Guided Pathways initiative so students can quickly identify an academic path that is linked with their end goal(s), get on their path, and stay on their path while learning the essential knowledge and skills that will yield success in their lives. The College continues to map changes to guided pathways pillars and assess outcomes through student surveys and software data which provide key insights that help to advance and enhance student access, completion, and post-completion success.

- Implemented 124 Live Teach classrooms in a matter of months.
- Over 6,600 new students, including transfers, were advised by a professional advisor compared to 3,800 last year.

Nassau Community College continues its annual "Day of Service" on Tuesday, April 13th with a day-long celebration to serve those in need and honor NCC on-site workers who have unselfishly dedicated their time over this past challenging year, including 30 nursing students who serve on NCC's Surveillance Testing Program team.

"At Nassau Community College we are committed to providing not only a high-quality education to the communities we serve, but participating as active members of those communities. For the last decade the College community has come together to dedicate their time to NCC's Day of Service and provide necessities for members of our Long Island communities," said Dr. Jermaine F. Williams, President, Nassau Community College. "This year, we also acknowledge the service of our NCC community members who were physically present at the College during this past challenging year, including 30 of our nursing students who have volunteered their time to serve as part of a team managing the College's Surveillance Testing Program. Without these critical

members of the NCC community, the College would not have been able to continue to provide the caliber of education and support resources our students are accustomed to and for that we honor them."

A decade ago, NCC's "Day of Service" was developed by the College's First Year Experience Program with the goal of bringing together the NCC community, administration, students, faculty and staff, to volunteer their time and talents to help those in need. For this year's celebration, the NCC Fashion Club, working with local high school students, have created a digital button to commemorate the 2021 celebration. The image is included below and has been incorporated into a pin that will be distributed to all of our NCC frontline faculty, staff, and student aides involved in the COVID testing process on campus.

Additional projects for NCC's Day of Service include a children's book drive, a campus cleanup with Covanta, an animal shelter donation drive as well as a donation drive for the Nest, NCC's on-campus food pantry. All collections will take place in the parking lot across from Public Safety.










Student Activities Thrive at SUNY Nassau

The Title is Back! SUNY Nassau Men's Lacrosse National Champions





The SUNY Nassau Men's Lacrosse team secured its 22nd NJCAA Men's Lacrosse Championship with a thrilling double-overtime victory over second-seeded Harford (MD). The Lions currently hold the NJCAA record for most championship titles, with 22. The last title came in 2008, when Nassau defeated CCBC Essex.





Additionally, Nassau head coach John Savage earned Coach of the Tournament honors on the Lions' home field. In his fifth season at the helm of the tradition-rich Lions' program, John Savage led Nassau to its 50th championship appearance and its 22nd title. Savage took over the program in 2016, having accomplished winning seasons in each of his five years in Garden City.

Nassau Community College Offers Men's Volleyball and Women's Flag Football

Grant Funds Received from NJCAA Foundation, First Point Volleyball Foundation, National Football League (NFL) and Reigning Champs Experiences (RCX)



Nassau Community College has been selected to receive \$20,000 in grant funds from the NJCAA Foundation, First Point Volleyball Foundation, the National Football League (NFL) and the Reigning Champs Experience (RCX) to begin offering men's volleyball (Spring 2022) and women's flag football (Spring 2023) as official sports at the College. SUNY Nassau was one of 15 NJCAA member colleges chosen to receive \$10,000 in grant funds for men's volleyball and \$10,000 in grant funds for women's flag football. The grants were awarded to schools who expressed an interest in starting the two collegiate varsity offerings on campus.

"At Nassau Community College we are focused on providing

our students with a high-quality education, excellent support services, and extracurricular activities that provide a solid foundation for their future successes," said Dr. Jermaine F. Williams, President, Nassau Community College. "We thank the NJCAA, the First Point Volleyball Foundation, the NFL and Reigning **Champs Experiences for providing** the College with the opportunity to bring these athletic offerings to our students. We truly are a community at SUNY Nassau and our coaches are laser-focused on the student-athlete achieving. We look forward to cheering on all of our Athletic teams in the upcoming seasons."

With the addition of both men's volleyball and women's flag football, the College now offers 25 intercollegiate athletic offerings including baseball, basketball, cheerleading, cross country, Esports, football, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, tennis, outdoor track and field, volleyball and wrestling.

Nassau Community College Selects Former Olympian and World Champion Vougar Oroudjov as Men's & Women's Wrestling Head Coach


