Created in 1959 as part of the State University of New York (SUNY), NCC first held classes in a wing of the old Nassau County Courthouse in Mineola, New York. When the college officially opened in 1960, just 632 students took advantage of the affordable, high-quality academic programs. In 1962, NCC expanded to 135 acres at the former Mitchel Air Force Base and enrollment soared.

Today, the college is located in the heart of Long Island on a beautiful 225-acre campus with 48 buildings including an affordable, on-campus childcare center and a Life Sciences building that opened in 2012. NCC is the largest single-campus community college among the 30 community colleges in the State University of New York (SUNY) system. NCC serves a large geographic area which encompasses Nassau, Suffolk and Queens Counties on Long Island, as well as other parts of the New York City metropolitan area.

NCC is a comprehensive, full-opportunity community college offering more than 70 fields of study with facilities, technology, small class sizes and great teaching that help students reach their educational goals. The college graduated 2,715 students with degrees and certificates in 2020-2021. About one million people have attended NCC to date. Among NCC's 140,000 graduates are doctors, attorneys, teachers, and business and political leaders. The college has an active NCC Alumni Association and is well-known and well-regarded in the communities it serves. Many of NCC's students benefit from the work of the NCC Foundation in fundraising, managing, and distributing scholarship funds as well as supporting academic program development.

NCC is justifiably proud of the excellence of the faculty with 17% of full-time faculty members holding doctorate degrees, twice the national rate for community colleges. Additionally, more NCC faculty have received the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching than any other community college in the state.

Nassau Community College is accredited by the **Middle States Commission** on Higher Education and is authorized by the Board of Regents to award two-year Associate degrees in arts (AA), science (AS), and applied science (AAS) and is also authorized to award Certificates for programs of study of less than two years. Many specific academic programs are also accredited separately by appropriate professional organizations.

- To enhance the economic and cultural vitality of the County by promoting an educational environment which responds to the changing needs of the community.



The Campus



The 225-acre campus is located in central Nassau County and is easily reached from the Meadowbrook Parkway (Exits M3 and M4) or from entrances on Stewart Avenue and Hempstead Turnpike. Students attend classes in modern classroom wings and in picturesque older buildings once used by the U.S. Army and Air Force. Students have access to the latest available equipment for teaching health sciences, engineering technologies, marketing and business, computer technology, liberal and fine arts, mathematics and sciences, and the performing arts.

Central to the campus is a plaza which connects a 12-story Administrative Tower containing many campus offices, including Admissions, Registrar, Bursar, Financial Aid and others; an extensive Library (described under "Learning Resources"); and a 192,000 square-foot Physical Education Complex, which is one of the finest in the Northeast, and includes swimming and diving pools, a gymnasium, a fieldhouse, saunas, and specialized rooms for wrestling, dance, gymnastics and indoor ball games.

The Social Sciences and Visual Arts Building (Building G), which opened in January 1997, is where 9,000-10,000 students attend class. The departments of Art, Criminal Justice, Economics, History/Geography/Political Science, Psychology and Sociology hold their classes in this space. The Social Sciences and Visual Arts Building has 37 classrooms and two state-of-the-art lecture halls. In September 1997, the new 85,000 square-foot College Center (CCB) opened. The Center accommodates student activities, student government, the Faculty-Student Association, various student clubs, and conference facilities. The central meeting area is a multi-purpose room designed to accommodate banquets, theatrical productions, film and video, dances, and large meetings. Several study lounges and two conference rooms are located on the second and third floor, along with a dark- room and computer area for the student newspaper.

The A. Holly Patterson Library supports students in an active learning environment, providing research assistance and access to information in multiple formats produced worldwide. Group and individual study spaces, anatomy and physiology models, reserve copies of current textbooks, over 200 computers for student use, and information literacy instruction conducted in electronic classrooms round out the Library's offerings.

The campus also houses the David S. Mack Center for Training and Intelligence which is used to train officers from police departments all over Nassau County. Still planned for future construction are a Theatre and Performing Arts Center, and improved public spaces and walkways.

Nassau County, on **Long Island, New York** is a dynamic and lively place to live and to visit. The county offers beautiful beaches, charming downtown areas, numerous museums, world class shopping and dining, abundant recreational opportunities, and a rich history. Nassau County is less than 20 miles from Times Square and is easily reached by the Long Island Railroad or via major highways. With four airports nearby, it's accessible from just about anywhere in the world.

More on Nassau County

Nassau Community College is in **Garden City, New York**. As of the 2020 census, 23,272 people lived in Garden City with a racial makeup of 88.8% White, 1.1% African American, 4.7% Asian, 0.4% from other races, and 3.1% from two or more races. Hispanic or Latino of any race were 6.3% of the population. In addition to the Incorporated Village of Garden City, the Greater Garden City area in the 11530 zip code includes another incorporated village, Stewart Manor, as well as two unincorporated areas of the Town of Hempstead: Garden City South and East Garden City – the latter of which was absorbed by the Census Designated Place of Uniondale. In addition to NCC, several other colleges and universities are in Nassau County including Hofstra and Molloy Universities, Farmingdale State College and Stony Brook University.

Governance



Nassau Community College defines shared governance as a commitment on the part of the faculty, trustees, the administration, and SUNY to work together, each as fully accountable entities, to carry out the college's educational mission, vision, and strategic plan responsibly and effectively.

The Academic Senate at NCC has celebrated a long tradition of collaborative decision making since the 1960's. In 2017, The Board of Trustees passed a resolution that directed the College President to revise the shared governance structure and to present to the Board on or before September 1, 2017. The revised Senate bylaws were adopted and its impact on the College governance system has been ongoing.

The Academic Senate is how the members of the faculty provide a voice and represent their respective constituencies. At present, there are 24 Senate committees which actively engage in serving the campus. These committees address areas such as curriculum, faculty development, applied learning, academic standing and assessment. There are also special ad hoc committees. The Senate receives proposals from its committees, provides feedback and forwards the recommendations to the President for implementation or discussion with the Board of Trustees.

The purpose of shared governance is to ensure meaningful faculty participation in institutional governance. The senators and alternates are full-time faculty members and students elected by faculty, students and representatives from the CSEA and AFA respectively. The 10 members of Administration are appointed by the President. The additional nonvoting ex officio members have privileges of the floor, make motions, take part in debates, and enjoy all the other privileges of membership except for voting and being an officer.

The ultimate authority for College operation is vested in the Board of Trustees, five of whom are appointed by the Nassau County Executive and four by the governor of New York. A tenth member is elected annually by the student body.

Academics



Nassau Community College currently offers Associate in Arts (AA), Associate in Science (AS and Associate in Applied Science (AAS), Associate in Occupational Studies (AOS) degree programs as well as certificate and not-for-credit Lifelong Learning education courses and programs. Students can choose from more than 70 degree and certificate programs that prepare them for transfer to four-year colleges or for immediate entry into high-demand careers.

NCC also serves lifelong learners in the local community as a provider of workforce development education to those employed by local corporate partners and to members of the community seeking to enhance their employment opportunities by completing (non-academic) professional certificate programs such as Pharmacy Technician, Real Estate, Medical Billing and Emergency Medical Technician.

For English language learners, NCC offers a range of options depending on the students educational, personal, and work goals including ESL classes for admitted students, an English language immersion program, and the Language Learning Center.



Students

The college currently serves almost 13,000 credit students and about 1,300 non-credit students in continuing and professional certificate programs in Fall terms. The college attracts a diverse student body that includes recent high school graduates, working adults and displaced workers, veterans, traditionally underrepresented students, English language learners, international students, student-parents, students with disabilities, low-income students, and first-generation college students, as well as students with a postsecondary credential preparing for new careers.

NCC is the top choice for about 15% of high school graduates in Nassau County. Approximately 81% of the college's students are Nassau County residents and about 8% each are Queens and Suffolk county residents.

About 39% of first-time-in-college (FTIC) students are first generation in college students and 81% are receiving financial aid.




At Nassau, the hours spent outside the classroom are as important as those spent in study. The extensive campus life at Nassau Community College offers students the opportunity to sample their career choices or explore recreational areas of interest. Nassau campus life offers over 100 clubs to join and numerous recreational and social events to attend. Spring, summer, winter or fall, Nassau Community College offers students an outstanding array of activities for relaxation and personal growth.

The college also operates an award winning radio station, WHPC, "The Voice of Nassau Community College," which was named the ONLY Community College radio station finalist for the "Best College Radio Station" Marconi Award in 2022 and 2019. The Nassau-Adelphi Gateway program gives students an opportunity to earn their associate degrees while being a part of campus life at Adelphi University. In addition to being able to live at Adelphi and participate in University activities, students have easy access to streamlined transfer pathways for completing their bachelor's degrees.

There are numerous student support services that focus on fostering student growth and preparing them for success, including personal, financial, spiritual, and social needs. The goal is to create and maintain an engaging and safe campus environment that has an appreciation for the diversity present on our campus and in our community.

Challenges & Opportunities

- Like many community colleges, Nassau Community College has experienced a decline in student enrollment, which began before the pandemic and continues today. Developing strategies to increase student enrollment and retention with an equity lens will be an important priority for the new President.
- Like many colleges across the county, NCC has seen reduced funding related to the enrollment decline which presents a financial challenge for the college. The new President will cultivate strategic partnerships to help secure additional streams of revenue to ensure financial stability and strengthen the college programs and services.
- The new President will promote and further build the college's reputation and create a branding and marketing strategy that will make Nassau Community College the college of first choice for more high school graduates, service area residents, and other prospective students.
- The new President will be forward-thinking and lead the college in embracing new technologies, processes, modalities, and educational programs, including a greater focus on workforce preparation programming to best meet student expectations and community needs.
- Nassau Community College operates within a shared governance structure where a large percentage of employees belong to collective bargaining units. The new President will be eager to work collaboratively within a unionized campus and a shared governance system that provides the framework to benefit from listening to the voices of employees across the college.
